HAZZANIC LEADERSHIP

Shabbat January 23rd was a particularly auspicious shabbat – known as ‘**Shabbat Shira – The Sabbath Of Song**.’ The name is derived from *Shirat Hayam – The Song Of The Sea*, Exodus 15, which Moses and the Children of Israel sang when they were saved from the Egyptians after crossing safely through the

Red Sea. We read the Torah portion B’shalach which ushered in a period in our calendar known as ‘**Jewish Music Season**.’ In continuation of this theme, this article is related to synagogue music.

In the past 2 years that I have been honored to be called upon by our congregation to fulfill the dual role of hazzan/acting rabbi, I have often been asked questions like - how does it feel? What are the challenges? How do you juggle all the additional responsibilities? Can you perform the duties of a rabbi?

While cantors are usually associated with the music of the synagogue, I wonder how many are aware of the critical solo role Hazzanim have played in the development of the early American synagogue? The following history will show that my current role as sole clergy of B’nai Israel except for occasional rabbinical assistance, is not as unusual as some might think:-

For **186 years** after the arrival of the first Jews in the United States (around 1654), there was not a single ordained pulpit rabbi. Hazzanim became solo leaders of the emergent Jewish communities, filling the void that was left as a result of the reluctance of rabbis to leave old established communities to come to the new world. In doing so, they were called upon to perform religious functions usually associated with the rabbi, and became, out of necessity, and frequently with great distinction and longevity, what is known in Hebrew as a “kol bo – one who does everything.”

Great Hazzanim of early American Jewish history included Isaac Da Costa of Charleston, SC; Isaac Touro of Newport, RI, who was appointed at the age of 20 in 1759; Gershom Seixes who served the Spanish-Portuguese Synagogue of NY from 1766 – 1816; Jacques Lyons who served the same synagogue from 1839 – 1877; and Isaac Leiser of Mikveh Israel in Philadelphia who served from 1829 – 1868. These and others contributed immensely to the survival, vitality and growth of early American Judaism.

Hazzan Seixes, for example, was invited to attend Washington’s inauguration as President and served as trustee of the

Humane Society and Columbia College. He was a prominent Zionist and outstanding ambassador to the non-Jewish community. Hazzan Lyons, although a brilliant cantor, also branched out into many other areas. He was a founder of Mt. Sinai Hospital and many other prominent institutions. Leiser’s 39 years in Philadelphia saw many innovations in which he was instrumental, such as his preaching in English, the establishment of Hebrew and day schools, the Jewish Publication Society, translations of the Bible and prayer books to English, a national monthly Jewish magazine – *The Occident*, a Jewish orphanage, promoting Zionism, the first union of Jewish congregations, and the Maimonides Theological Seminary.

Since many communities were small or poor and unable to maintain both a professional rabbi and a cantor, some preferred cantors, citing Jewish law which stated that communities unable to afford both, should rather engage a cantor to ensure the community’s ability to worship. They could always turn to other rabbis (not from their own congregations) when needed.

New York City, in 178 years from 1682 – 1860, had six rabbis but 52 cantors in its 27 synagogues. After the Civil War, a steady stream of talented star cantors arrived in the USA and were the forerunners of what became known as the “Golden Age of the Cantorate”, setting off feverish competition amongst congregations who made huge investments to appoint famous cantors, and charged admission to hear them lead services.

For example, Newark, NJ, where my father-in-law, Jerry Lacker, and my wife Jan were born, had one of the largest and most prominent American Jewish communities till the 1950s. One of its claims to fame was that their famous Cantor Berele Chagy who served Newark’s Adas Israel till 1932, was at the time, the highest paid cantor in the world.

So in response to questions I often get about what it’s like to function as both rabbi and hazzan, my answer could well be, “it’s not that unusual!”

I continue to be honored to be charged by you with this dual role, and I humbly pray that I continue to rise to the occasion as B’nai Israel prepares feverishly for our rapidly approaching milestone 150th year of celebration beginning this September. However, I could not do it without the amazing, talented volunteers who step up regularly to assist me as needed, joined by Rabbis Alan Sokobin and Jason Miller whose presence is critical to our smooth functioning.

Our school needs adult volunteers to provide some of our students with 'one on one' assistance on their studies. A knowledge of Hebrew is helpful but not always essential. The confirmation class is still participating in "Hire a Mensch" to raise money for their upcoming trip to Israel. Our principal Kim Brody would love to hear from you.

Israel Taking Leadership Role Facing the Threats of Climate Change

This is the text of a talk given by Michael Tamor at Shabbat services after his return from a trip to Israel.

Good Morning. When the Hazzan asked me to talk about my visit to Israel last November, it was difficult to figure out why anybody here would be interested in a simple business trip. With a little time to think back on why I was there, what I saw and who I talked to, and the general state of the world, I began to think there might actually be an interesting story here. What I would like to do is tell you a little bit about why I was there and what I observed, and then get a bit philosophical tying these to Israel's place in the world.

For those of you who don't know me, I am in charge of research in energy systems and sustainability at Ford Motor Company. My trip had three purposes: 1) to give a keynote speech at the Fuel Choices Summit, an international conference on the future of renewable fuel for transportation, which is my area of research – I'll come back to this later, 2) to do what is called "tech scouting" of new companies and university research projects, and 3) to interview a candidate for the head of the research lab Ford is building in Israel. I was mainly in Tel Aviv and Haifa, with one day of tourism in Acco and Caesaria.

The last time I was in Israel was June of 1977. This was the middle of a rather depressed period between the Yom Kippur war and the peace treaty with Egypt. There was a bit of a third-world feel with abandoned construction projects everywhere. The transformation is amazing. The areas I visited were like San Diego or Palo Alto ... with Hebrew. Tall buildings under construction everywhere, new light rail systems, good roads, shopping malls, restaurants and a human energy that you don't see in many places. This prosperity is in large part due to a very rare thing: successful government policies. In reaction to 1970s economic doldrums and inflation, economic reforms of 1984 freed up capital markets and allowed much more private investing in Israel. At the same time a flood of highly educated Russians poured in, creating an explosion of entrepreneurial activity. Israel – the 'Start-Up Nation' in the recent book of the same name - now has the most non-US companies on the NASDAQ exchange for small-company stock and the highest per capita venture capital investment in the world. Technology companies all over the world have set up centers in Israel, and exports of software, cybersecurity technology, pharmaceuticals and medical devices are booming.

Here is where I get philosophical. Despite its spectacular economic success, it seems Israel still faces the same historical challenges it always has. What have people fought

over ever since the dawn of history? The Greeks had the list right, but in the wrong order: water, earth, fire and, most recently, air. Water for hunter-gatherers. Earth, meaning land for agriculture. Then lots more land for draft animals – the energy that multiplied the power of human ingenuity until only two centuries ago. Fire - the coal, oil and gas that replaced animals to power the modern age.

Israel is woefully short on all of these and surrounded by very unhelpful neighbors. But instead of surrendering to poverty and dependency, Israel has met each of these challenges in turn with ingenuity and world-leading technology. Israel leads the world in industrial scale desalination of sea-water. Drip agriculture technology developed in Israel is used all over the world. In fact, my host told me about his trip to Peru where he inquired as to why Israeli flags decorated the mountainsides, to find out that each one advertised a farm using Israeli technology. As for energy, Israel now has a good size off-shore gas field, but it is very difficult to store natural gas and it is awkward to use in vehicles. Furthermore, for energy security, it must be converted to a liquid for safe underground storage. The technology for converting one form of energy in another was a major theme of the Fuel Choices conference.

So where am I going with this, you ask. To put it in biblical terms, the fight over the last element, air, may have begun. The coal and oil that nature accumulated underground for millions of years is being released in decades. This rush of carbon dioxide is changing Earth's atmosphere enough to actually alter the climate. These changes may be hard to predict, but are almost certainly going to be unpleasant. But once you are in the business of converting one form of energy into another, you can stop thinking about coal, oil and gas, and start thinking about the wind and the sun. Of those Israel has plenty.

Once again, with all its intellectual capacity, its new entrepreneurial spirit, and driven by its own strategic needs, Israel finds itself ideally positioned to take a leading role in facing the threats of climate change. This leadership opportunity was the theme of my presentation at the Summit.

To - hopefully - tie all my threads together, the geography and politics of Israel force it to be a leader - if not *the* leader - in addressing the fundamental challenges that affect everyone - water, food, energy and the greatest challenge of all, climate change. In short, this is Tikkun Olam on a global scale - what can save Israel, may save the entire world. Maybe my trip wasn't so amazing, but I hope you find this prospect as amazing as I do.
